# **About Diversity Films**

Diversity Films is a Community Interest Company (CIC), established in April 2007, which aims to

- Work for and promote the elimination of discrimination and inequality based on race, colour, creed, ethnic or national origin, gender, marital status, sexuality, disability, age or class, within the area of moving image content production.
- Champion and nurture underused or existing media production skills and provide opportunities for new practical, creative and critical skills to be acquired through a programme of training, practical moving image content production, exhibition and critical debate.
- Enable community groups and individuals within those groups to realize their own talent with confidence
- Provide a platform for bold voices and visions and allow talent to express itself without fear of censorship, exclusion or retribution.
- Combat social exclusion through access to training, resources and inclusive community based activities.

## **Community Filmmakers Project**

#### **Summary:**

Diversity Films' first main project, the Community Filmmakers Project was set up to develop and work with a new generation of filmmakers from new and existing communities in Glasgow through a programme of structured training workshops, drop-ins and community cinema screenings. Through this project, we aimed to provide a platform for these individuals and communities' distinct voices and visions to be developed, seen and heard on their own terms, and disseminated at a local, national as well as international level.

Through the project, we worked primarily in the Greater Easterhouse and Scotstounhill areas of Glasgow, with partners **Platform**, **Innerzone**, **F.A.R.E.** and **Kingsway Health and Wellbeing Centre**, to provide training, mentoring and film production equipment to community groups with the aim of creating sustainable film units in the areas which the groups will gain the skills to drive themselves.

In addition to working within specific communities, the project also focused on creating an environment where individuals and groups within communities can come together to work with individuals and groups from other communities.

The Community Filmmakers Project was funded by **Scottish Screen**, the **Paul Hamlyn Foundation** and **4Talent**. More information about our funders and partners can be found at the end of the report.







# **Community Filmmakers Project Productions 2008**

#### **International Kingslink Carnival** 15'31

Leo Saidenough/Kingsway Eye

A short documentary about the annual carnival taking place in Kingsway Court in Glasgow's west end. In dear memory of our very own Eddie "Broomfield" Donnachie who passed away in spring 2008.



#### ExNE- The Movie 32'16

A musical extravaganza following a group of 60 budding young musicians taking part in the East by North East music initiative in Easterhouse. 50 songwriting and music workshops, 1 original album 3 performances and a youth music festival later...a new generation of musical talent awaits...

The documentary was filmed over eight months by a team of new and young filmmakers trained and mentored by Diversity.



The second stage of the new recruitment drive was a Christmas themed Open Day in December. Events included screenings of all of the Kingsway Eye films, a film-making taster workshop, a tombola and a Video Voice Box where community members could record their issues.

# \*brand new

Launched in February 2009, Brand New is a new signature project of Diversity Films, supported by Scottish Screen, the Paul Hamlyn Foundation, Scottish Arts Council and 4Talent.

Building on what we learned from the Community Filmmakers Project, the project offers a free, open access community-based filmmaking training programme, where participants who would not otherwise have the opportunity can learn filmmaking skills from professional filmmakers.

The project aims to be inclusive and reaches out to people who may have no experience of making films at all, but also to people who've had some training but want more.

Brand New has three strands: drama, documentary and community TV, and it operates in three areas of Glasgow - Scotstonhill, Govanhill and Easterhouse - working to inspire people to tell their own stories on their own terms for a wider audience.

With monthly weekend film schools and weekly evening workshops as its main training delivery model, Brand New also provides free bookable access to HDV filmmaking and editing equipment for their enrolled participants at the appropriate stage of their project's development. Crucially, the programme is free, eliminating the most obvious barrier between prospective filmmakers and the training they need: finance.

The first Community TV weekend film schools kicked off in February at Kingsway Health and Wellbeing Centre closely followed by Brand New Drama at Platform in Easterhouse.









### **Brand New 2009 Films**

Workshops, film-development and film-making is well underway across Glasgow with the aim of making up to 20 projects by the end of the year, but first film to the finish post was **Get Real 2!** directed and produced by husband and wife team, Leo and Elena Saidenough from Kingsway Eye.

The episode was inspired by local community members Noreen Real and Jean Donnachie, who campaigned fervently against the dawn raids in Kingsway and were awarded Evening Times' Scotswomen of the Year 2008.

While Noreen normally presents Get Real!, Leo and Elena surprised Noreen and Jean with a special episode dedicated to them which tells the story of their award-winning campaign.

With support from the Scottish Community Foundation, a series of 5 Get Real episodes including Get Real 2! will be produced through Brand New and Kingsway Eye in 2009.
